# TREES TO OBSERVE AT REDWOOD PARK

#### ALDER (ALNUS GLUTINOSA)

Height 20m or more. Age up to 150 years. Rapidly growing tree mature at about 60 years with long trunk and narrow crown.



## ASH (FRAXINUS EXCELSIOR)

Height 45m. Age up to 200 years. Magnificent large deciduous tree with distinctive black buds in spring.



## ASPEN (POPULUS TREMULA)

Height 20 to 30 m. The aspen has a broad open crown, is lightly branched with twisting branches. The lower branches are often horizontal.




## **BEECH (FAGUS SYLVATICA)**

Height: Max 40m. Age: mature at 120 years Magnificent, large, deciduous tree.



## **BIRD CHERRY (PRUNUS PADUS)**

Height 15m. Small deciduous tree with black egg shaped fruit.



## **BLACKTHORN (PRUNUS SPINOSA)**

Height up to 5m.

A deciduous large shrub or small tree with blackish bark and dense, stiff, spiny branches.



## COMMON BOX (BUXUS SEMPERVIRENS)

Height up to 9m. An evergreen shrub or small tree growing 1-9 m tall.





## COMMON DOGWOOD (CORNUS SANGUINEA)

Height 2-6m. A medium to large deciduous shrub, growing 2-6 m tall, with dark greenish brown branches and twigs.




## **CRACK WILLOW (SALIX FRAGILIS)**

Height to 27m. Age typically to 200 years but possibly 1000. Small rapid growing tree. Twigs break off with a sharp crack.



## FIELD MAPLE (ACER CAMPESTRE)

Height: max 25m. Age: 50 - 100 years. Small tree with small yellow green flowers. Leaves yellow in autumn but also red or golden brown.



## GUELDER-ROSE (VIBURNUMOPULUS)

Height up to 4-5 m tall. The leaves are opposite, three-lobed, 5-10 cm long and broad, with a rounded base and coarsely serrated margins.



# TREES TO OBSERVE AT REDWOOD PARK

## MOUNTAIN ASH (SORBUS AUCUPARIA)

Height up to 20m.

Mountain Ash is renowned for its sheer hardiness, coping with soil types, ranging from dry to damp.

## HAWTHORN CRATAEGUS MONOGYNA)

Height 10 - 15m. Age long lived - 250 years Deciduous tree dense leaved and thorny with short trunk. Distinctive white blossom with strong scent and red berries (haws) later.



## WEEPING WILLOW (SALIX BABYLONICA)

Height up to 12m. An ornamental tree that grows by water. Long thin trailing branches of yellow twigs and lanceolate leaves.

WHITEBEAM (SORBUS ARIA)

Medium Deciduous tree with red berries.






## PEDUNCULATE [COMMON] OAK (QUERCUS ROBUR)

Height 30 - 40 m. Age 1000 year or more. Large deciduous tree and probably the commonest tree in Britain. Usually found in mixed woodland.



## HAZEL (CORYLUS AVELLANA)

Height max 6m. Max age 70-80 years Deciduous shrubs and small trees frequently coppiced and used for hedges.

**SILVER BIRCH (BETULA PENDULA)** Height max 25m. Max age 60 - 80 years.

A smallish fast growing short lived tree. Rapid growth for first 20 years and mature at 40 years.

#### HORNBEAM (CARPINUS BETULUS)


Height max 30m. Age max 150 years. A sturdy deciduous tree superficially resembling Beech.



## SCOTS PINE (PINUS SYLVESTRIS)

Height 40m. Age - typically up to 150 years but 300 possible.

Large evergreen and only native British Pine.



#### WILD CHERRY (PRUNUS AVIUM)

Height 60ft 15m. Age up to 200 years. Small deciduous tree with round red fruit. Highly rated for timber.
